National Updates: DFE

Staying informed and up to date with the latest research and guidance is crucial for ensuring your subject knowledge remains relevant. This will not only strengthen your ability to lead meaningful discussions with school leaders and inspectors but also help you deliver high-quality RSHE education that truly meets the needs of your students.

The Department for Education has recently published two key reports that are highly relevant to RSHE: "Relationships, Sex and Health Education— Implementation of the 2020 Curriculum and Guidance in Schools" and "Teaching Relationships Education to Prevent Sexual Abuse." These reports provide valuable insights and practical suggestions for improving RSHE delivery and enhancing the support we offer to young people.

We strongly encourage you to take the time to read these reports, as they will be instrumental in helping you refine your approach and stay aligned with the latest expectations and best practices. Summaries and key findings are available on the RSHE Network website.







Policy Review Reminder

As there has been no further movement with the draft guidance, it's essential to review your school's RSHE policy. Previously, the advice was to hold off on any updates, but we have now be informed that Policies should be reviewed using the 2020 guidance we recommend undertaking a full review.

This process must include consultation with parents and/or the wider community, as well as with staff and students. Ensuring all stakeholders are involved will create a well-rounded policy that reflects the needs and values of your school community.

Additionally, updates to Keeping Children Safe in Education 2024 have implications for PSHE, and should be considered. Including new sensitive topics like sextortion, which should be carefully considered in your curriculum and therefore reflected in the policy,

Introducing: The Disconnect to Reconnect Campaign

We are excited to share Device Wise's latest initiative: the Disconnect to Reconnect campaign. This campaign encourages young people and families to take regular breaks from screens and digital devices, fostering stronger real-life connections and improving overall well-being. The goal is to raise awareness of the impact excessive screen time can have on mental health and relationships, and to inspire more meaningful offline interactions.

The campaign has already seen great success in Leeds, with positive feedback from schools, parents, and young people. Led by Doctor Charlotte Armitage, a clinical psychologist specialising in digital health, the initiative has sparked important conversations about creating healthier digital habits.

By teaching health literacy, we equip students with the knowledge and skills to understand and manage their health, navigate healthcare systems, and critically evaluate the vast amount of health information they encounter—especially in today's digital age.

Health literacy goes beyond understanding basic health facts; it fosters the ability to assess risks, seek support when needed, and take proactive steps in maintaining a healthy lifestyle. As issues like mental health, nutrition, and online safety become increasingly relevant, it is crucial that young people develop the confidence to engage with these topics and have the correct language and understanding to do this.

Young People's Language Corner

In response to popular demand from our members, we are excited to introduce a new regular feature: Young People's Language Corner.

This section will help professionals stay informed about the evolving language and terminology used by young people today. It's crucial to understand the words, phrases, and slang commonly used by students, as this can enhance communication and ensure professionals are alert to any potential safeguarding concerns that may arise from the language young people use.

Each edition will feature key terms and explanations, helping you stay mindful of language that may not always be familiar but is important in young people's everyday lives. This resource will support you in staying aware of emerging trends and issues affecting young people.

Term	Definition
Blue balls	A term referring to discomfort from sexual arousal without ejaculation. Sometimes used to pressure someone into sex.
Вор	A derogatory term for someone with multiple sexual partners (similar to "slut").
Cancelled	Losing social status or public favour, often online (e.g. Harvey Weinstein, R Kelly).
Cuck	Short for "cuckold," referring to a man perceived as weak or dominated, often by a female partner.
Chad	A term for an overly masculine, often arrogant male.
DL (Down Low)	Refers to a closeted gay man who may secretly engage in homosexual activity while in a heterosexual relationship.
Don't be a pussy	A derogatory phrase suggesting cowardice, reinforcing stereotypes of women being weak.
DSL	Colloquial term referring to "dick sucking lips," usually asked over text.
Edging	The act of stopping sexual activity before climax.
